

A Tribute To Our Soldiers In Mountain View Cemetery

Our November meeting of the Warren County Genealogical & Historical Association was attended by another large crowd.

Guest speaker was Mountain View Historian



Rickey Burks who presented a program in tribute to a few of the 600-700 veterans who are interred at the Mountain View Cemetery in McMinnville.

Those soldiers

have been involved with all major U.S. engagements for the last 158 years:

The Civil War 1861-1865

The Spanish American War 1898

World War 1 1917-1918

World War 2 1941-1945

The Korean War 1950-1953

The Vietnam War 1964-1975

The Persian Gulf War 1990-1991

The War in Iraq

Many of the soldiers also served honorably during peace times and/or in the National Guard.

Veterans included in this tribute are:

Pvt. Fesington Calhoun Lowry, Confederate,

Feb 3, 1842 - April 22, 1924 was the first recorded burial in Mountain View Cemetery on April 23, 1924.



He was with Co. C, 35th

Regt., TN Infantry. He enlisted on September 6, 1861, was a POW in May of 1962 and mustered out in 1863.

Pvt Hamilton Mortimer Hennessee,

Confederate, Jan 27, 1845 - Mar 17, 1929 was with Co D, 16th Regt, Tenn Infantry. He enlisted March 8, 1863, at the age of 19 and left the Confederate Army in 1964.

Pvt Jasper J. Martin, Confederate, April 7, 1834 - Jan 25, 1929, Served in Co. C, 16th Tenn

Regt. under Capt. D.M. Donnell and Colonel Savage.

Pvt. Martin fought in the following battles: Murfreesboro, Chattanooga, Chickamauga, Missionary Ridge, Resaca, GA, Perryville, KY and Franklin.

He was wounded near Atlanta GA July 22, 1864 and was disabled. He was captured and remained in prison to the end of the war.

William Trousdale Earles, Confederate, March

2, 1846 - May 16, 1909. He was a member of Colonel John M. Hughes' 25th Regt. TN Infantry that was organized Aug



1861 at Camp Zollicoffer and surrendered 4 officers and 21 men April 9, 1865.

Pvt Howard Rouse Jan 15, 1879 - Oct 22, 1962.



He served in the Spanish American War 1898.

A member of Co. A 3rd Regt Missouri Infantry, he joined

April 27, 1898, Kansas City, MO and was discharged Nov 7, 1898.

He was married to Nellie Earles, daughter of W.T. Earles.

Cpl Tiffin Marion Jackson Sept 14, 1879 - Sept

16, 1966. He served in the 8th Battery United States Artillery during the Spanish American War. Later in civilian live he served as



Secretary/Treasurer of the Warren County Fair.



Seaman 1st Class Paul Pollard Jackson June 27, 1921 - June 11, 1954 served in WWII was married to Cora Alice Martin and died at age 33 from complication due to stomach cancer.

Col Carl William Campbell, Sr Mar 6, 1916 - Nov 3, 1985, United States Air Force WWII is



Mountain View Cemetery's highest ranking soldier. He enlisted into the United States Army Air Corp at Camp Forrest,

Tullahoma, Oct 28, 1942.

He was a pilot with the 8th Air Force in the European Theatre of Operations during WWII. He served as a squadron

commander, group operations officer and commander and was decorated with the Distinguished Flying Cross and the French Croix de Guerre.

Col. Campbell was married to the beloved school teacher Melba Onieta Moore Campbell. He was a former superintendent of McMinnville City and Warren County Schools. Because Col Campbell had Cherokee ancestors he was named "Grey Hawk" by Cherokee Chief White Path.

TSGT E6 Glenn O. Hall May 6, 1937 - Aug 18, 2018, enlisted in the National Guard in 1955. He



then enlisted in the U.S. Air Force in 1956.

He was stationed at several bases throughout his years of service including Darmstadt Germany, McClellan AFB at Sacramento, CA, Brindisi Dei Normani, Italy, Kelly AFB, TX, and Misawa, Japan. He was a veteran of the Vietnam

War and was stationed in Korat, Thailand during that period in 1968-1970.

TSGT Hall received the USAF Commendation Medal and was honorably discharged from Kelly AFB in August 1976.

Pvt. Luther Brown Moffitt Sept 20, 1893 - Oct 6, 1918 served in WW1. He was inducted into the Infantry July 25, 1918 and received training with Co B, 7 Inf Repl Regt and Co B 3 Inf Repl Regt, Camp Gordon Ga. He died at Camp Gordon Oct 6, 1918 of

lobar pneumonia. His mother received the Gold Star Award.

Pvt Moffitt was part of the Camp Gordon Human Eagle. He was a Post Office clerk and was most noted as being the



director of the McMinnville Silver Band. He was known as "Doc" Brown and created the first Central High School band. Known as the "Father of the School Band Movement", many high schools began patterning their bands after his.

SGT Homer L. Medley Aug 20, 1930 - May16,



1968 served 18 years in the United States Army, 1950-1968. He was assigned to 2nd Sqdn, H Co, 11th Army Cavalry Regiment. He was a tank commander and achieved the rank of platoon Sergeant. Sgt. Medley was KIA May 16, 1968 by enemy sniper. He was

scheduled to end his Vietnam tour of duty 3 months later.

Veterans included in this article were taken from sections 1-5, 9 and 10 of the cemetery This article is taken, in part, from Rickey's power point presentation to WCGHA.

Long-Time WCGHA Treasurer Retires



WCGHA President Cheryl Watson Mingle is show presenting a Certificate of Appreciation to Allen Jaco for his years of dedicated service to our Association. Allen announced that he is retiring from his duties as Treasurer and Membership Committee Chairman at the end of the year.

When I asked Allen Jaco to jot down a few things about his life so I could write a story about him, he sent this to me:

About 7 years ago Cheryl Mingle asked me if I would consider being WCGHA's treasurer. I accepted the challenge, and now that I have had my 86th birthday, I feel I need to spend more time on getting my family genealogical data organized in a manner my descendants can learn who some of their ancestors were, so I am making some changes to try to accomplish this goal.

Born near Sledge, Quitman Co., MS in 1933, I lived on several cotton farms as one more share cropping family on the rich, flat delta land created by the floods of the nearby Mississippi River eons ago. My family moved to Memphis, TN in 1942, the first full year of WWII, enabling my parents the opportunity to work in defense plants making airplane motors and bodies. I attended public schools in Memphis and graduated from Memphis State College (now University of Memphis) in 1956, with a major in Industrial Arts and minors is Business and Journalism, serving as the Business Manager of the student newspaper "Tiger Rag", and the president of the Kappa Sigma fraternity (largest on campus).

U.S. Military has always been a part of my life and all ways will. Beginning in grammar school when WWII started, I participated in the war effort drives including collecting several materials such as: tinfoil from wrappers of gum and cigarette packages, tin cans, scrap iron, newspapers and other paper products, rubber etc. - each being school class competitions. Also in the neighborhood Marine Corps formed by the boys, who had Saturday battles on a large vacant field with the different service branches represented by adjoining areas – using BB guns, stones, "horse apples" (hard, grapefruit sized fruit of the Bois d'Arc tree) for weapons and metal garbage can tops and dug fox holes for defense. Prisoners were frequently shot with BB guns!

At South Side High School the Army R.O.T.C. was required for male sophomores and juniors in the 1940's and 1950's. I made Private during the first year, Sargent the second and as a volunteer in my Senior year, I was a Captain.

While attending Memphis State College, the Air Force R.O.T.C. was required for the first two years. I volunteered for the advanced final two year program, but failed the pilot physical due to a high decibel hearing deficiency.

Upon college graduation, I immediately volunteered to become a navy officer. Following the four month U.S. Navy Officer School (OCS) in Newport, Rhode Island, I was commissioned "an Officer and Gentleman", an Ensign in rank. I sailed from Brooklyn, New York with the Navy's Military Sea Transportation Service command for 18 months and logged over 250,000 sea miles, including one trip of circling the globe, also visiting 14 foreign countries during the year and half. Our vessels' mission was to move military personnel from one place to another. For the last 18 months of obligated duty I was the Executive Officer (X.O .in military terms, being second in command) of the Armed Forces Examining Station on White Bridge Road in Nashville, Tennessee, with the mission of giving physical and mental examinations to military volunteers, draftees and others relating to military service. During this time I took 4 night classes in real estate sales and appraising. Following my obligated 3 years, 4 months of active duty, I volunteered to serve in the Naval Reserve, and did so for the following 19 years, retiring in 1978 with the rank of Commander.

Barbara Byars and I were married in Memphis, TN on 6 Jun 1959, after 5 years of dating. We rented a garage apartment in the Belle Meade area in Nashville. After moving back to Memphis in December, I sold real estate for Boyle Investment Company for a year. The next year I began an 18 month period as an apprentice real estate appraiser with the Federal Housing Administration (FHA), and was there for 16 and a half years. During this time I was promoted to Data Appraiser, Multifamily Appraiser and Chief Appraiser. Our office served the West 31 Tennessee counties and NE 4 counties in Mississippi. FHA became a part of a new federal department, Housing and Urban Development (HUD). During my tenure I took numerous one and two week appraisal courses and qualified to become a residential member (RM) of the largest professional appraisal organization in the United States, American Institute of Real

Estate Appraisers. Shortly afterwards, I resigned from HUD, moved to McMinnville, TN where I went into business as Jaco Appraisal Services and since I had earned a Real Estate Broker license, I affiliated with the Kirby Real Estate office and later with Colonial Realty and Campbell Realty. I retired in 2000, after 40 years being in real estate.

A few years following retirement, I was asked by then Mayor Royce Davenport to become a member of the proposed Public Service Unit (PSU), with the mission of assisting our local city police department with routine duties that would relieve the limited paid force of such, and their time could be spent much more productive – such as: parade control, bike runs, leading funeral traffic, etc. It did get started, with an original 10 participants. It was my privilege to work with our fine police department and co-harts for 10 years, when I decided to retire from the unit.

Mentioning retirements – I am a Deacon Emeritus at First Baptist Church after serving 22 years as an active Deacon.

In the mid-1980's, a small group called "Friends of the Library" organized for the purpose of utilizing the space where the genealogy section is now located for exactly that purpose! To be used to make data available for searching family genealogy. Some of the members were Kate Smith, Robbie Beaver, Almeta Cunningham, A.C. and Leona Hillis and myself, with the cooperation of the Librarian, Cheryl Priest. We were successful in soliciting local contributions from individuals and businesses such as Bridgestone, etc. to purchase the first copier, shelving and other furniture to make the room functional. The library was able then to move the materials helpful for family searching into the room, hire Brad Walker to make it very functional to the many patrons. I was humbled to be asked to head up this short lived group, and have delighted to watch the continued progress.

I joined the Warren County Genealogy Association around 1993, not long after it was begun in 1992. After attending several meetings on the second floor of the McMinnville Electric Company building I became discouraged with them being primarily business meetings, and I felt I was wasting my time, not learning anything. So, about 8 years ago I decided to become active again after observing the meetings were much more meaningful to me. They still are!
