Using GPS on Our Cell Phones



The Warren County Genealogical and Historical Association enjoyed a very informative program at the June 19 meeting.

Most people who own Smart phones have used the term "give me the address and I will Google it" as a way to get to a specific location. This is your phone logging on to Google Maps and finding your present location then giving you directions to get where you are going.

Advancements in the satellite industry and tools that utilize these advancements offer new capabilities to the genealogy community especially for locating cemeteries. J. B. Brown showed us how to use Google Earth and the Latitute Longitude app on our cell phone to record a GPS location which can be saved to your phone or emailed to yourself for further investigation.



Analyzing these GPS locations in Google Earth allows us to

get a more detailed look at these locations which can often be adjusted for more accurate co-ordinates. Google Earth also

gives us the capability to save these locations as a .KML file which can be shared with others. Google Earth offers the capability to step backwards in time to view previous satellite images of the location. Detailed information about a location can be stored such as name.

address, notes or even a picture associated with the location. Multiple locations can also be saved as a group giving us the capability to store the locations of our ancestors graves or cemeteries located in a community or county.

To qualify for a certificate, applicants must directly descend from an ancestor





(male or female) who was in Warren County no later than the 1820 census (this includes the boundaries of the original formation of Warren County from White County).



The Cemeteries of Warren County committee have been meeting every 2 weeks for about 2 months. Only about half of the crew was at this meeting. They are currently reviewing the GPS locations of cemeteries using Google Earth. Thanks to some excellent sleuthing by Bettye Pack we have a definite location for the Unmarked (and thought to be lost) location of Isaac Anderson Cemetery. Also, thanks to Jimmy Haley, we located a new cemetery that we have named McDaniel Cemetery, located on Pike Hill Rd., containing one grave. J.B. Brown continues to research methods and ways to produce a paper map but has not yet found an option that will meet our budget requirements. Their next meeting is July 26th @ 3:45 p.m.


